Annual Plan 2024–25

At an Extraordinary Meeting on Wednesday March 20, Council agreed to proceed with the transitional option of preparing an annual plan for the coming 2024-2025 year.

This means Kawerau will prepare a long-term plan over a nine-year term from 2025 to 2034.

Council believes the decision to continue with the option of an enhanced annual plan provides the district with the lowest risk option after the new coalition government enacted the Water Services Acts Repeal Act 2024 in February. This legislative change will replace the former Three Waters' reform legislation with the Local Water Done Well legislation.

At the Extraordinary Council Meeting, Kawerau District Council also resolved to adopt the proposed budget for the coming year, which comprises an overall rates increase of 15.1 percent that maintains services at the current levels.

The increases for properties will vary depending on the individual value of residential, commercial, and industrial properties. To smooth the rates increase, council proposed increasing the uniform annual general charge (UAGC) from \$850 to \$950 in 2024-2025.

The consultation document will be delivered to all residents and non-resident ratepayers around mid-April. Please keep an eye out for public meetings so you can attend and have your say. A hearing for submitters to talk to elected members will be held on Wednesday, May 22.

Joint venture brings equitable healthcare to Kawerau

A new integrated primary healthcare GP practice is coming to Kawerau as Tarawera Medical announces new ownership.

The practice will now be owned in a partnership between Mataatua-based hauora provider Te Puna Ora o Mataatua, Green Cross Health, a provider of primary health care services across New Zealand, as well as Ngāti Tūwharetoa Bay of Plenty Settlement Trust, representing mana whenua within Tūwharetoa mai Kawerau ki te Tai.

The whānau GP surgery based in Kawerau currently offers a full range of general practice and nursing services to whānau living in the area.

Remaining long-term general practitioners of the practice, Dr Tony Whitehead, and Dr Mick Lavelle, have praised the new ownership, and said patients can feel confident knowing nothing changes.

Ngāti Tūwharetoa BoP Settlement Trust appreciates the improvements for the community the partnership will bring.

Chairperson Karilyn Te Riini said, "Building and strengthening the partnership with Te Puna Ora o Mataatua and Green Cross Health is essential to improve the coordination of care and address unmet healthcare needs in Kawerau."

Kawerau Mayor, Faylene Tunui, has echoed the comments of the settlement trust. She says "the new partnership marks an exciting step forward for mana whenua".

Mayor Faylene Tunui went onto say "I'd like to pay tribute to Drs Whitehead and Lavelle, who've cared for the people of Kawerau for over three decades and will continue to care for our people through the launch of the new partnership. We recognise their long service to our community. And we look ahead to the innovations that local, tangata whenua co-ownership brings."

Green Cross Health highlights the benefits of the new partnership that will continue to evolve healthcare to whānau in Kawerau.

Water Supply update

Currently the district is being supplied with water from the Tarawera bore. Work to ensure that the rohe has a secondary water supply from Umukaraka Spring is underway courtesy of the agreement of the landowner Māori Investment Limited. In collaboration with Māori Investment Limited, Council is upgrading the metering and infrastructure along with the resource consent application.

Work continues to upgrade the Pumphouse on River Road that includes:

- replacement of pumps and control systems
- installation of plant to include fluoride in the water supply (as directed)
- replacing the old lime system with sodium hydroxide system to ensure that drinking water remains in the correct pH range

New museum exhibition!

On Friday 1 March, an exhibition opened in the Museum Gallery. Ngā Pou o Te Tini o Kawerau. The carving of people in Kawerau. In 1972, councillor Lanham brought some plans and a proposal to create the Pou for the community. Peter Rua Lagan carved the Pou from Totara. He unveiled his work on January 8, 1983. The Pou is on the corner of Islington and Plunket Street. Museum staff came across these images and saw the journey through that special day with what is now the exhibition. When visiting the exhibition, we witnessed the unveiling and looked at the town from an early 1980s perspective. We hope you enjoy it as much as we do.

Why do lids need removing?

Please remove lids before you put bottles, containers or jars out for recycling.

Lids can be either too small or too flat to be separated by machinery at recycling plants. Sorting machinery can also mistake flat lids for paper, so they can contaminate paper recycling.

Lids can also trap contents in the container, making them too heavy for air jets to sort. Any leftover food trapped in the container can contaminate recycling, too.

Also, if lids are screwed onto the item, they can pop off under pressure and put people working in our Transfer Station at risk of injury.

Some lids are designed to stay on the container so there is no need to try to rip those off. Examples of these could be fruit punnets with the lids attached, or shampoo bottles.

Tin can lids are an exception- these can be recycled, but you must go the extra mile to do so. Make sure the lid is still attached, give the tin, and lid a rinse, and then push the lid back inside the tin and squash to ensure it is securely inside.
